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670 KING VALDEMAR'S ZEALAND LAW

Valdemar's Zealand Law is a Danish law book from around the year 1200. The law was a landscape law that covered Danmark's largest island Zealand. It was replaced in 1683, 15 April by Danske Lov (Danish Code) formally speaking, the Danish kingdom's first comprehensive royal law that formed the basis for the Danish legislation.

Apparently unmarked. Dated 1765-1790, based on the Emperor's reign. Diam. app. 15.5 cm.

Joseph II (1741–1790) was emperor of the Holy Roman Empire 1765–1790 and eldest son of Empress Maria Theresia of Austria and Emperor Francis I of the Holy Roman Empire.

Baron Jens Juel (1631-1700) to Juellinge Manor was an elder brother to Admiral Niels Juel (1629-1697), Valdemar's Castle.

Dated "paa Wort slott Kióbenhafn den 13 Maij 1622", i.g. at our castle of Copenhagen 13 May 1622. Signed by King Christian IV of Denmark. 1 leaf. App. 45 x 62.5 cm.

An exchange of property is an agreement between two or more parties to exchange land or properties without real financial intermediate.

Jens Juel to Kjeldgaard (1580–1634) was a cousin to Admiral Niels Juel's father, Erik Juel to Hundsbæk (1591–1657).

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ORIGINAL HANDWRITTEN DEED, 17TH CENTURY

Original handwritten deed, enumerating the properties the Danish king gives to Admiral Niels Juel, namely a part of Valdemar's Castle with the farm estates and the patronage right of Landet Church. Ink on vellum. Text in Danish. Dated "paa Vores Kongelige Residentz udi Kiöbenhaffn dend 14 Martij Anno 1678", i.g. at Our Royal residence in Copenhagen 14 March 1678". Signed by King Christian V of Denmark. 4 leaves [8 leaves folded]. App. 32.5 x 26 / 52 cm. Attached with the king's original wax seal in a wooden capsula. Diam. 11 cm. L. from the document app. 60 cm. *The Battle of Køge Bay on 1 July 1677 was a Danish victory over the Swedes in the Scanian War and brought great honor to Admiral Niels Juel (1629-1897). In 1677 he acquired Tåsinge and Valdemar's Castle for the income that the victory in Køge Bay had brought him. This was finally implemented on 14 March 1678, when the Danish king handed over these properties to Admiral Niels Juel. This deed is hereby the basic document for the Juel family's possessions at Tåsinge and Valdemar's Castle, which are still owned by Admiral Niels Juel's descendants.*

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

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676 CODE OF JUTLAND

Original handwritten manuscript on vellum, containing Jyske Lov (Code of Jutland): "Mæt logh scal land byggæs [...]", in Danish. Denmark c. 1400. Small 4to. Measurement of leaves: 12.8 x 9.8 cm. Measurement of binding: 14 x 10.5 cm. Brown and red ink on vellum, 4 leaves with brown and blue ink. 104 leaves. Some leaves with a 20th century pencil foliation. With marginal probably contemporary ink inscriptions. The manuscript ends with an incomplete sentence. The sentence is probably the beginning of an added variant of a regulation or code from a local law. After the last sentence it seems that



someone tried to decipher the marginal texts and used reagents to clarify the writing, leaving the vellum darker at the lower part of the page. With a previous owner's inscriptions from 1593 on (paper) flyleaf and paste down. The manuscript lies/is bound between respectively 12 and 25 blank paper leaves. Many browned leaves due to age. With varying thickness/quality of the vellum leaves. Bound in a [European] 16th century full calf binding with blind tooled decorations and 2 clasps. With signs of wear due to age and use.

"Jyske Lov" - Code of Jutland opens with the (in Denmark) very famous quote: "With law shall the country be built but if all men were content with what is theirs and let others enjoy the same right, there would be no need for a law. But no law is as good as the truth, but if one wonders what the truth is, then shall the law show the truth [...]".

The code is a civil code enacted under Valdemar II of Denmark and it covered both Funen, Jutland and Schleswig. Prior to the adoption of the Jutlandic, Zealandic and the Scanian laws, there had been no uniformity of the laws throughout settlements in Denmark. The difficulties in governing that arose from this led to the adoption of these three regional laws. The king did not sign it in Jutland, but rather at the royal castle at Vordingborg, Zealand in early 1241. The Code of Jutland was succeeded by Christian

V's Danish Code of 1683; however in certain parts of Schleswig, parts of the code were used until the arrival of Bürgerliches Gesetzbuch in 1900.

Stieglitz-Brockdorff to Scheelenborg Manor 1790-1827). She was in 1812 married to Baron Carl Juel-Brockdorff (1780-1859). See also lot no. 678 and 682.*

Carl Juel-Brockdorff (1780-1859) was son of Frederik Juel (1761-1827) and Lord of the Manor of Valdemar's Castle 1827-1859. Carl Juel-Brockdorff's wife was the heir to the Barony of Scheelenborg and at their marriage he took over this barony. It was in this context that Carl Juel-Brockdorff was elevated to the rank of baron, changed his name and his coat of arms by the above mentioned patent of nobility. See also lot no. 677 and 682.





Professor Hans Zoëga (1608–1673) taught logic at the University of Copenhagen. He also took an interest in Danish property trading. It has not been immediately possible to verify the above-mentioned house in Bredgade. Since the deed has been in the possession of the Juel family for generations, it is possibly concerning Kongens Nytorv 4 in Copenhagen on the corner of Kongens Nytorv and Bredgade. This house was owned by Admiral Niels Juel (1629–1697) from Valdemar's Castle in the years 1671–1697 and was then called Juel's Palace. It later changed owners and was rebuilt as Thott's Palace. Today it houses the French embassy in Denmark.

This interesting and unique collection of music gives us an clear insight into the music life at Valdemar's Castle during the mid 18th century to mid 19th century. Thanks to the chamberlain Frederik Juel (owner 1781-1827) and Carl Baron Juel-Brockdorff (1827-1859) the music life on the castle was European oriented – especially towards Germany – it was vivid and of high quality in classical music as well as in dance music. The collection is both of culturally and historically importance.

In 1738, the Danish poet Ambrosius Stub came across the owner of the family house Taasinge, first lieutenant and chamberlain Niels Juel (the grandson of Admiral Niels Juel). This acquaintance became decisive for Stub's existence. Juel was a fun-loving person and he lived a cheerful life at Valdemar's Castle or Thorsing Castle, as it was also called. However, it was not as a poet that Stub was engaged. He worked as both secretary, book keeper and librarian for Niels Juel, and stayed at the castle for two periods of time. In his first year at the castle, he wrote the beautiful poem "Den Kiedsom Vinter gik sin Gang", which is still highly valued. Few texts by Stub were published during his lifetime, but posterity has taken an interest in his oeuvre.

Stub left Valdemar's Castle in 1752, and he died in 1758 in Ribe – forgotten and in extreme poverty. At Tåsinge by Valdemar's Castle, an oak tree 'Ambrosius-egen' is named after the poet.







The Precht family is synonymous with the production of mirrors of the highest quality in 18th century Sweden, numerous examples having been attributed to Burchard or to his sons Gustav (d. 1763) and Christian (d. 1779). Originally from Bremen, educated in Hamburg, Burchard arrived in Stockholm in 1674 to work at Drottningholm Palace before being appointed carver to the court in 1682, further to the recommendation of the royal architect, Nicodemus Tessin the Younger. Precht became extremely influential in the development of the Swedish Baroque style.

In 1878, a number of silk and metal-thread carpets from the collection of Prince Ladislas Czartoryski were exhibited at the Paris International Exhibition. As some of the carpets displayed the Czartoryski coat-of-arms it was assumed that these rugs were made in Poland. It was later recognized that this group, distinguished by a silk pile and metallic brocading, was Persian, made during the reign of Shah Abbas I (1587 – 1628.) The Safavids ruled Greater Iran from 1501-1722 and again from 1729-1736. The Polish attribution, however, persisted, and these carpets still bear the name 'Polonaise'. In 1945 a Czartoryski Polonaise (inv.no.45.106) with five unattributed coats-of-arms was given to the Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York, by John D Rockefeller, Jr., onetime owner of the present example.

The design of these weavings is derived from the repertoire of earlier Persian motifs but the rich silk pile, highlighted with gold and silver brocading, and muted but lively colors, signals a change from the past. These luxurious carpets epitomize the wealth and opulent taste of the 16th and 17th century Persian Court. The taste for the lavish Shah Abbas style was disseminated through ambassadorial and trade routes with the West where 'Polonaise' carpets found great favor with the Baroque nobility of the 17th century European Courts.

Some examples still remain in old European collections, such as the Duke of Buccleuch, the Marquess of Salisbury and the Princes of Liechtenstein, some have passed to national and private museums in Italy, Germany, Holland, Austria, France, Denmark, Portugal, Russia, Poland and Hungary, to name a few. Several of those which left Europe for the US, particularly in the late 19th and early 20th century when the great tycoons were forming their collections, are now in American museums.

The glamour associated with the ownership of such carpets has persisted and Polonaise carpets have long been objects of desire in the most prestigious of collections from the Medicis of 17th century Italy to the most eminent families of the 20th century. $DKK 250,000-275,000 / \notin 33,500-37,000$

The Bidstrup Estate

Surrounded by green forests and large fields in the beautiful area of East Jutland in Denmark lies the picturesque Bidstrup estate.

According to an inscription on the main building, it was built in 1220 by Bishop Absalon's brother, Styge Hvide. Later on, it has housed some of the oldest and most distinguished Danish noble families who were witnesses to some of the most central events in Danish history.

The Bidstrup estate was bought by the merchant Gehrdt Hansen de Lichtenberg (1697–1764) in 1749. Lichtenberg acquired a fortune by trade and through his marriage to his wife Bodil Hofgaard (1711–1795), who was the daughter of Horsens' mayor. The fortune was invested in landed property during the agricultural crisis of the 1730s, when land was cheap, and with his headquarters at the Engelsholm estate, he became the owner of eight Jutland estates and was also engaged in brick, paper and metal production.

Lichtenberg, who was ennobled in 1735, donated large sums to the churches, the Latin school and the poor service in his birthplace, Horsens, where he also had Lichtenberg's Palace built in 1744 and received King Frederik V as a guest in 1749. The palace housed his large cabinet of curiosities including the large rhinoceros vessel sold at Bruun Rasmussen in 1998.

The current buildings at Bidstrup were renovated by the renowned German architect Nicolaus Hinrich Rieman (d. 1759) immediately after the takeover. This renovation has been described as a masterpiece, and together with the buildings for breeding it forms a complete manor complex from the Baroque period.





John Cobb (1715-1778) worked in premises at 72 St Martin's Lane, London. He completed his apprenticeship in 1736 and went into partnership with William Vile in 1751. Situated in the mountainous region 60 miles east of the large city of Tabriz, Bakshaish is the oldest rug weaving village in the region of Persian Azerbaijan, noted for carpets with highly artistic, tremendously diverse abstracted adaptations of ageold tribal and classical Persian motifs.

Bakshaish carpets were the product of the Persian home craft, usually woven in room size or oversize formats on a loom attached to the outside wall of the weaver's home.

The best Bakshaish carpets offer a unique combination of geometric allover design or graphic geometric medallion format, along with their own intriguing adaptation of the traditional repetitive Herati pattern with unparalleled use of natural color and soft tones for large format carpets. All-over field designs of overscale emblematic or stylized floral patterns offer striking graphic artistry. Bakshaish rug weavers are renowned for creating carpets featuring the age-old Tree of Life motif. They fit perfectly into contemporary or casual decors, and brilliantly enhance the casual, organic ambiance of mountainside homes.

Among connoisseurs, early antique Bakshaish rugs, (especially circa 1875 or earlier, as well as the best late 19th-century examples) are the most highly prized of the extremely desirable Northwest Persian village carpets.

The 19th-century examples of Bakshaish weaving, if artistically distinguished, memorable in their beauty. Panoramic wallpaper:

Already at the end of the 18th century, panoramic wallpaper was ready to replace tapestries and silk panels, which had become too expensive for bourgeois and aristocratic homes.

The motifs showing the neoclassical style, which was in vogue at the time, experienced an unprecedented growth and many workshops appeared, both in Paris and in the provinces.

Joseph Dufour's workshop was one of the most famous of them and compete with the other wallpaper companig called Zuber.

Joseph Dufour was born in Tramayes (today in Saône-et-Loire) in 1754, he first settled in Macon, where his factory was founded in 1797, before settling in Paris ten years later. The designers Laffitte and Xavier Mader brought their talent to the company and gained traction and popularity in all parts of society.

Dufour then began his production of panoramic papers, often depicting colorful classical, oriental or even very exotic landscapes from the shores of the Bosphorus to the islands of the South Sea or as we discover at this sale architectural landscapes with animated mythological scenes, showing young girls in Greco-Roman tunics and uniformed soldiers on horseback, while elsewhere they indulge in the joys of the swing.

Born in Herdon, Germany in 1849, Joseph-Emmanuel Zwiener is recorded as having worked in Paris at 12, rue de la Roquette from 1880 to 1895. His successful atelier executed elegant pieces of furniture replicating articles from the Garde-Meuble National of France, most notably the celebrated bureau de Roi by Jean-Henri Riesener and Jean-François Oeben. Working mainly in a vigorous interpretation of the French Rococo style, Zwiener's furniture is often inset with the finest marquetry, vernis Martin panels and applied with delicate gilt-bronze mounts. In awarding Zwiener a gold medal for his stand at the 1889 Paris exhibition, the jurists noted 'dès ses débuts d'une Exposition universelle, [il] s'est mis au premier rang par la richesse, la hardiesse et le fini de ses meubles incrustis de bronzes et fort habilement marquetis.'

The celebrated carver Luigi Frullini (1839-97) was active during the latter half of the 19th century, producing, to critical acclaim, Renaissance revival objects and furniture from his Florentine workshop at 8 via Santa Caterina. Already known locally, his travels to London and Paris, were undoubtedly important in increasing his client base. In the years following, he obtained important commissions for the daughter of Queen Victoria, and for the daughter of the Grand duchess of Russia (S. Chiarugi, Botteghe di Mobilieri in Toscana 1780-1900, Florence, 1994, pp.312-315, 474-477). Frullini's illustrious private English patrons included Sir William Drake, for whom he produced an entire drawing room, commissioned through William Blundel Spence.

In America, Frullini produced an entire dining room and library for tycoon William S. Wetmore's Newport residence Château-Sur-Mer.

The Philadelphia Museum of Art retains a suite of library and dining room furniture by Frullini.

Further examples of his work can be found in the Victoria & Albert Museum in London, and the Museum für Angewandte Kunst in Vienna.

At this auction we present an exclusive selection of Prince Valdemar and Princess Marie of Denmark's Russian and French miniature Easter egg pendants, of which most were presents from Tsaritsa Maria Feodorovna of Russia. They have all been kept safe by their descendants in Denmark until today.

A Royal Couple - the Sailor and the Artist

Prince Valdemar of Denmark (1858-1939) was born as the youngest son of the future King Christian IX (1818-1906) and Queen Louise of Denmark (1817-1898), later called "The In-laws of Europe". Thus, Prince Valdemar of Denmark's siblings were King Frederik VIII of Denmark, King George I of Greece, Queen Alexandra of the United Kingdom, Tsaritsa Maria Feodorovna of Russia and Duchess Thyra of Cumberland. Prince Valdemar was born in a time when his name became popular due to a historical interest in the Middle Ages. His Christian name therefore could be traced back to Danish kings in the 12th-14th centuries, namely Valdemar the Great, Valdemar the Victorious and Valdemar Atterdag (the Return of the Day). Compared to most of his siblings, Prince Valdemar had a more humble approach to life. E.g. he was offered to be king of Bulgaria in 1886 and to be king of Norway in 1905 – two offers, which he both refused. He was educated in the Danish navy and became a naval officer and admiral. He was thoughtful, at peace with himself with both feet firmly planted on the ground, and clear about his desires in life. As Prince Valdemar of Denmark said: "To me it has always been enough being Prince of Denmark and sailor".



In 1885 Prince Valdemar married Princess Marie of Orléans (1865-1909), who was a grandchild of King Louis Philippe I of France. The princess was very French, highly intelligent, a skilled painter and became a humorous addition to the Danish Royal family. The newlyweds settled in The Yellow Palace as their Copenhagen residence. Princess Marie was used to hosting salons and liked to invite painters, actors, composers, and writers. The people of the navy got a good place to visit here as well. Princess Marie also cooperated with the State Councilor H.N. Andersen and The East-Asiatic Company. This resulted in a positive influence on the company's development in Danish trade with East Asia and a close relationship with the Royal family of Siam. Prince Valdemar participated in this expansion, e.g. as commander of the Danish cruiser Valkyrien, which arrived in Bangkok in 1899. As a sailor's wife, Princess Marie had an anchor tattooed on one of her arms. At the anchor was her saying in French "Qui s'en grogne, je m'en moque", which roughly translates to "Those who complain, I don't care about". Princess Marie also influenced her

father-in-law, King Christian IX, in 1901 to appoint a prime minister from the Left Reform Party. By this decision the king accepted democratic majority decisions in the Danish parliament. Princess Marie passed away after a brief period of illness already in 1909, unfortunately while Prince Valdemar was away on a sea voyage.

As a widower, Prince Valdemar became known as "The Uncle of Kings". At this time his nephews were King Christian X of Denmark, King Haakon VII of Norway, King George V of the United Kingdom, Tsar Nicholas II of Russia, and King Constantine I of Greece. Prince Valdemar became an institution and his advice was often sought on family-related and family-political issues, and he was always a welcome guest in his large family. In 1919, his elder sister, Tsaritsa Maria Feodorovna of Russia, widow of Tsar Alexander III of Russia, had lived 53 years in Russia. Now she had to flee the country due to the Russian revolution and settled down at Hvidøre Palace, north of Copenhagen. Prince Valdemar was a very clever and thoughtful support for the exiled sister and tsaritsa until her death in 1928. In the late 1930s, Prince Valdemar recounted his memoirs to Hans Roger Madol, and they were published in 1938.

The Children of Prince Valdemar and Princess Marie

Prince Valdemar and Princess Marie of Denmark had five children: Aage, Axel, Erik, Viggo and Margrethe. They were nicknamed "the unruly from The Yellow Palace" due to their overwhelming sense of humour and cheerful behaviour. Prince Axel married Princess Margaretha of Sweden and Princess Margrethe married Prince René of Bourbon-Parma. The Princes Aage, Erik and Viggo married non-royals and were all three appointed Counts of Rosenborg. Prince Valdemar and Princess Marie were thus ensured a widely branched posterity.

The History of the miniature Easter Egg Pendants

The tradition of the miniature Easter egg pendants is of Russian origin. Here it was a costume on Easter morning to give Easter eggs to family and friends to celebrate the resurrection of Jesus Christ. The Easter eggs could be of wood or porcelain. They could also be produced by Fabergé, who – inspired by the great Easter eggs for the tsars and tsaritsas – with an innovative design continued the old Easter tradition with miniature Easter egg pendants. The demand for the miniature Easter egg pendants grew as well as their popularity in general. Therefore, European jewellers – in France and other places – also began to produce them.

Provenance

The provenances of the miniature Easter egg pendants are very prominent. The Russian eggs were presents from Tsaritsa Maria Feodorovna of Russia (1847-1928) to her younger brother and sister-in-law, Prince Valdemar and Princess Marie of Denmark. The French eggs were acquired either by Princess Marie herself or were presents from her French family.



Originally, the miniature Easter egg pendants were not immediately intended as jewelry, but as gifts with a religious meaning. This interior from c. 1905 shows the office of Grand Duchess Olga Alexandrovna of Russia (1882–1960) in her St. Petersburg Palace. She had her miniature Easter egg pendants hanging as memorable collector's items on chains in the two show cases to the right and to the left of the desk. (Private photograph).





- 16.1 BRK tager forbehold for fejl, tekniske vanskeligheder samt udefrakommende misbrug eller forstyrrende påvirkning under auktionen. Budgivere kan ikke rejse noget krav mod BRK som følge heraf.
- 16.2 Køber er i alle tilfælde selv ansvarlig for korrekt betaling af moms og andre afgifter, gebyrer mv. i overensstemmelse med danske og udenlandske regler.
- 16.3 Medmindre andet fremgår af disse købsvilkår, kan BRK aldrig blive ansvarlig for budgivers/købers driftstab, avancetab, andre indirekte tab eller følgeskader.

17 PERSONDATAPOLITIK

- 18.3 Tvister skal indbringes i Danmark ved Københavns Byret, jf. dog punkt 18.2. I forbrugerforhold gælder de ufravigelige værnetingsregler.

Bruun Rasmussen Kunstauktioner

These conditions of purchase represent Bruun Rasmussen Kunstauktioner A/S' ("BRK") conditions of purchase for live auctions and are effective from 1 January 2017. BRK may modify the conditions of purchase at any time.

By bidding, the bidder/buyer accepts the current conditions of purchase as they appear on bruunrasmussen.dk. The conditions of purchase are applicable to both business owners and consumers.

BEFORE THE AUCTION

1 VALUATION OF ITEMS

1.1 All the offered items are valued by BRK. The valuation is an estimate based on the expected hammer price, see paragraph 5.3. The estimate is based on the previous sale of similar items as well as BRK's past experience. The hammer price can therefore be higher or lower than the estimated price.

2 DESCRIPTION OF ITEMS

- 2.1 Items up for auction are presented with photographs and descriptions in catalogues and on bruun-rasmussen.dk. The description is worded according to the best of BRK's knowledge and based on detailed research in accordance with the prevailing views among experts at the time of sale.
- 2.2 The items up for auction are of an age and nature that often mean that they are in a worn, repaired or damaged condition. As a starting point everything is sold as used items. For this reason, the descriptions in the catalogue or at bruun-rasmussen.dk do not include a statement regarding the above or the condition of the item.
- 2.3 In some cases, BRK may choose to describe an item's provenance. Such a description is made if a former owner is publicly known and/or if the story of previous ownership sheds further light on the item and its background. In other cases, such information is left out of the description, for instance to meet the seller's wish for privacy.
- 2.4 It is possible that the estimate and description are revised prior to the auction. Changes are published on BRK's website.

3 PREVIEW

- 3.1 Items up for auction are presented prior to the auction in one of BRK's showrooms. Potential bidders are encouraged to inspect the items closely and are responsible for determining the condition of the items at these previews, where they also have the opportunity to consult with the valuation experts.
- 3.2 If a potential buyer does not have the opportunity to inspect the item personally, a condition report can be drafted in most cases. The description in this report has been made according to BRK's honest conviction but is not based on scientific studies. A condition report only serves as an identification and is meant as an aid to bidders who do not have the opportunity to inspect the item at the preview.

DURING THE AUCTION

4 THE ROLE OF BRK

4.1 The sale of an item is facilitated by BRK on behalf of the seller, and BRK always sells items up for auction at the highest price offered during the bidding round.

- 4.2 Items up for auction can have a reserve price that has been agreed upon with the seller. The price is confidential and the item cannot be sold below this price.
- 4.3 The live auctions are presided over by one of the Danish Ministry of Justice's appointed auctioneers, ensuring that the auctions proceed correctly and lawfully.

5 BIDDING

- 5.1 The currency used while the auctions take place is Danish kroner. The approximate amount in euro/US dollars is shown on screens in the saleroom and also on request.
- 5.2 The auctioneer determines the size of the bid increment and the pace of the auction. Bid increments usually rise by 5% - 10% compared to the previous bid. Approximately 50-100 auction lots are sold per hour.
- 5.3 The hammer price refers both to the gavel used by the auctioneer that signifies the end of a bidding round on an item and to the price (bidding amount) that the item up for auction is sold for. See paragraph 7 regarding amounts added to the hammer price.
- 5.4 The buyer is the bidder that submits the highest bid, thereby obtaining the hammer price. At the moment the hammer price is determined, a binding purchase/sale agreement is entered into based on these conditions of purchase.
- 5.5 If bids are made on behalf of others, the bidder serves as surety for the transaction.
- 5.6 Items are purchased in their present state and condition, and regardless of the type of bidding the buyer has no right to cancel his purchase, neither under the Danish Consumer Contracts Act.
- 5.7 Bidders are required, in accordance with BRK's instructions, to identify themselves and document their ability to pay, for instance by registration of a valid debit/credit card, bank guarantee or a deposit.
- 5.8 BRK may refuse to accept a bid if a sufficient guarantee of the bidder's ability to pay is not provided, or if the bidder has previously defaulted on payment obligations on purchases from BRK.
- 5.9 The overseeing auctioneer will, in consultation with the auctioneer at the podium, decide what to do in matters of dispute concerning a bidding round.

6 TYPES OF BIDDING

- 6.1 Bidding options:
 - IN PERSON:

Registration and obtaining the bidding paddle take place at the entrance to the saleroom. When the bidder wishes to bid, it is signalled to the auctioneer on the podium by raising the bidding paddle in the air and clearly displaying its number.

COMMISSION BIDS:

The intended maximum bid can be submitted via bruunrasmussen.dk until the start of the auction or by e-mail, fax or phone, so that the bid is received no later than 24 hours prior to the start of the auction. A commission agent bids on behalf of the bidder within the limits of the stated maximum bid. The commission agent will always bid the lowest possible amount to achieve the hammer price.

TELEPHONE BID:

With certain items it is possible to have a BRK employee call the bidder over the phone. The employee will then bid on behalf of the bidder during the auction. The service can be booked via bruun-rasmussen.dk up until three hours before the auction is set to begin.

LIVE BIDDING:

It is possible to follow the auction live and bid on the auction lots via bruun-rasmussen.dk.

PRE-AUCTION:

Some live auctions are preceded by an online auction. The highest bids from the online auction then represent the starting bids at the following live auction.

AFTER THE AUCTION

7 AMOUNTS ADDED TO THE HAMMER PRICE

- 7.1 In addition to the hammer price, see paragraph 5.3, the buyer pays a buyer's premium for the individual items as well as the other amounts described below if the conditions for these are applicable. The total amount that the buyer pays to BRK is called the "purchase price".
- 7.1.1 Buyer's Premium: The hammer price always includes an additional fee to BRK. At the live auctions, the fee is 25,6% of the hammer price + VAT of the fee, 32% in total. For stamps and coins, the fee is 20% of the hammer price + VAT of the fee, a total of 25%.
- 7.1.2 "LIVE Bidding": BRK's "LIVE Bidding" software is free to use for bidders on bruun-rasmussen.dk.
- 7.1.3 Full VAT: Certain items are sold at auction in accordance with the current rules regarding full VAT. In such a situation, a VAT of 25% is imposed on both the hammer price and the buyer's premium. These items are marked in the catalogue and on bruun-rasmussen.dk with the symbol "*", or with the text: "This item is subject to full VAT".
- 7.1.4 Artist's Resale Right: In accordance with Danish copyright law, a royalty fee covering the Artist's Resale Right has to be charged for works by newer Danish artists, and some foreign artists, who are either alive or have not been dead for more than 70 years. The royalty fee covering the Artist's Resale Right is charged on behalf of VISDA (Visual Rights Denmark). These works are marked "ARR" in the printed catalogue, and on bruun-rasmussen.dk the description of the works includes the text: "This lot is subject to the Artist's Resale Right". The royalty fee covering the Artist's Resale Right is added to the hammer price + the buyer's premium (excluding VAT) if the amount exceeds EUR 300, as indicated below:

Hammer price + buyer's premium (ex. VAT) Payment Rate

300,01 - 50,000 euro	5%
50,000,01 - 200,000 euro	3%
200,000,01 - 350,000 euro	1%
350,000,01 - 500,000 euro	0.5%
over 500,000 euro	0.25%

The royalty fee covering the Artist's Resale Right cannot exceed EUR 12,500 (excluding VAT) for each item. The fee must be paid in Danish kroner, and the conversion rate (EUR/DKK) is set by VISDA.

7.1.5 Debit/Credit Card Fee: Amounts Added to the Hammer Price: BRK reserves the right to charge the debit/credit card fees imposed by the payment services companies. The rates will appear when bidding on bruun-rasmussen.dk and at payment.

8 PAYMENT DEADLINE

8.1 The purchase price falls due after the hammer price has been determined, and then the buyer has eight days to pay BRK the purchase price.

9 PAYMENT METHODS

- 9.1 The payment can be made in the following ways:
 - A: With debit/credit card (Visa, MasterCard, Maestro, Diners Club, China UnionPay and JCB) or cash (up to DKK 19.999) in the saleroom or subsequently at one of

BRK's locations. Please note that we do not accept EUR 500 banknotes.

- B: With debit/credit card (Dankort, Visa, MasterCard, Diners Club and JCB) via BRK's website on the buyer's personal page.
- C: By bank transfer into BRK's account with Danske Bank: 4183 4310970638 · Swift/BIC: DABADKKK · IBAN: DK4130004310970638.

10 VAT EXEMPTION, PAYMENT & DEPOSIT

- 10.1 Some buyers can choose which type of VAT should apply to the transaction. The choice has to be communicated to BRK no later than two working days after the purchase and cannot be changed subsequently.
 - A: Businesses in Denmark registered for VAT can decide that the transaction is to be conducted in accordance with the rules for full VAT, see paragraph 7.1.3.
 - B: Businesses registered for VAT in another EU Member State can be exempted from paying Danish VAT if it can be proved that the item has been transported to the foreign address that the buyer has registered with BRK and which is written on the invoice. In such cases, the VAT should be settled according to the rules applicable in the country where the buyer is registered for VAT. It is advisable to consult with the local authorities. The buyer can decide not to be exempt from regular VAT and instead pay Danish VAT on second-hand goods/ full VAT.
 - C: Buyers residing outside the EU can be exempted from Danish VAT if it can be proved that the item has been transported out of the EU. To the extent possible and for a fee, BRK can issue the necessary export documents for the customs authorities. The buyer may decide not to be exempt from regular VAT and instead pay Danish VAT on second-hand goods/full VAT.
- 10.2 Companies registered for VAT in another EU Member State and buyers residing outside the EU must deposit the Danish VAT on the amount invoiced with BRK until the export process has been completed in a documented, lawful fashion. If the export is undertaken by one of BRK's authorized forwarding agents, the VAT does not have to be deposited. See the list of authorized forwarding agents on bruun-rasmussen.dk.

11 OVERDUE PAYMENTS

- 11.1 If payment is made after a deadline, including the deadline specified in paragraph 8, interest on overdue payments will be charged and estimated in accordance with the Danish Central Bank's official lending rate + 8% per year on the amount due.
- 11.2 If the purchase price, including interest, has still not been paid ten days after the demand for payment has been made, BRK is entitled to seek the purchase price paid by making a set-off against the deposit/by drawing on the bank guarantee or to cancel the purchase.
- 11.3 If the purchase is cancelled, BRK is entitled to sell the item at a new auction and demand the costs and any difference between the new and the earlier hammer price (including the buyer's premium) covered by the defaulting buyer.
- 11.4 In addition to debt collection, BRK may seek recovery of all due claims (including costs) not paid in a timely manner in the following ways:
 - A: Making the buyer cover the costs of selling items consigned to auction by or on behalf of the buyer. The sale can be conducted without regard to an agreed reserve price. Items consigned for auction cannot be collected as long as overdue debts are unpaid.
 - B: Seizing the buyer's remaining balance with BRK, including the balance from the sale of items consigned by or on behalf of the buyer, regardless of whether such receivables derive from auction sales prior to or after the date of the buyer's default on the payment.

12 PICK-UP & COLLECTION

- 12.1 The title to a purchased item passes to the buyer when the full purchase price, including any interest and fees, has been paid, and only then can the collection of an item take place.
- 12.2 In connection with the collection of a purchased item, BRK reserves the right to demand satisfactory documentation that the person who wants to pick up the item is either the buyer himself/herself or authorized by the buyer to receive the item on his/her behalf.
- 12.3 The collection of certain weapons requires presentation of a valid weapons certificate. Items with such requirements are listed with the text: "The purchase of this item requires the presentation of a valid weapons certificate" in the catalogue and on bruun-rasmussen.dk.
- 12.4 Purchased items are stored after the auction at the buyer's expense and risk. Pick-up must take place no later than eight working days after the last auction day.
- 12.5 If the item(s) is/are not picked up on time, the purchased items will be transported to a warehouse at the buyer's risk and expense. The transport costs are DKK 150 including VAT per item and the storage costs are DKK 150 including VAT per item for each week or part of a week. If an item is left unclaimed for an amount of time that results in the storage costs exceeding the value of the item, BRK will be entitled to, at the buyer's expense and risk and without regard to the reserve price, sell the item at an auction or privately. The buyer is still liable for the costs of transportation and storage not covered by such sale.
- 12.6 In accordance with current anti-money laundering laws, the buyer must in certain cases submit personal information and present a photo ID to BRK before the buyer can have the purchased item placed in his possession.

13 SHIPPING

13.1 If the buyer is unable to pick up the purchased item, BRK offers to pack and arrange delivery either by mail or by freight forwarder at the buyer's risk and expense. See paragraph 12.2 regarding identification.

14 EXPORT LICENSE

- 14.1 To ensure that Danish cultural heritage of vital importance remains in Denmark, the Danish Cultural Assets Commission can place an export ban on certain items. If the buyer wishes to export an item that is subject to an export ban in Denmark, the purchase will be cancelled and the Danish Cultural Assets Commission is obliged to acquire ownership of the item for the price obtained at auction. The buyer cannot raise any claims against BRK as a result of an export ban.
- 14.2 Certain items are included in the Washington Convention, also known as CITES. The purpose of CITES is to stop the trade of items made with endangered species and flora. If the item is included in the Washington Convention, CITES, Appendix 1, this will appear in the description of the item on bruun-rasmussen.dk and be marked with the symbol "[®]" in the catalogue. The following rules are applicable:
 - A: Items that are included in the Washington Convention, CITES, Appendix 1, can only be traded when a dispensation in the form of a CITES certificate has been obtained. BRK obtains the required certificate from the Danish Nature Agency that allows trade and export to countries within the EU. Items that were produced before 1947 can, however, be freely traded within the EU without a certificate.
 - B: It is only items included in the Washington Convention, CITES, Appendix 1 that are marked individually on bruun-rasmussen.dk and in our catalogue. Items included in the Washington Convention, CITES, Appendix 2, which can be freely sold and transported within the EU, are not individually marked.
 - C: Export to countries outside the EU must, regardless of the year of the item's production, always procure a CITES re-export permit from the Danish Nature Agency if the item is included in the Washington Convention, Appendix 1 and 2. This export permit can usually be

obtained without problems, if the item is either sold with a CITES certificate or was made prior to 1947. Appendix 2 items usually also receive a re-export permit without problems. Any fees charged by the Danish authorities in connection with the issuance of a reexport permit will be added to the buyer's invoice.

D: In connection with export to other countries outside the EU, special rules may apply concerning the subsequent import, and the buyer is encouraged to consult the relevant local authorities about this issue.

15 DEFECTS IN THE PURCHASED ITEMS

- 15.1 The lack of conformity rules of the Danish Sale of Goods Act may apply. Below is a non-exhaustive excerpt of the buyer's remedies in regard to lack of conformity.
- 15.2 The buyer is entitled to cancel a purchase if the description contained significant errors that have led to a higher hammer price than a correct description would have resulted in. In such cases, the total purchase price will be refunded. The buyer cannot demand payment of interest on the purchase price or demand payment of any other expenses or losses.
- 15.3 A purchase cannot be cancelled and the buyer cannot demand a refund of the purchase price or raise any other claims against BRK if the description of the item is in compliance with paragraph 15.2. The same applies if evidence of forgery has required the use of scientific methods that were either not available at the time of sale, were excessively costly to use or led to the damage of the item in question.
- 15.4 Claims for a cancellation of a purchase must be notified to BRK when the buyer has discovered the fact that entitles the buyer to cancel the purchase. This notice, however, has to be given no later than two years after the final pick-up date according to paragraph 12.4. The item purchased must be returned to BRK in the same condition as it was on the day it was sold at auction. If these conditions are not met, the buyer loses the right to cancel the purchase and cannot claim a refund of the purchase price. The buyer is responsible for paying the costs associated with the return of the item.

16 OBJECTIONS & LIMITATIONS OF LIABILITY

- 16.1 BRK is aware that errors, technical difficulties and external abuse or disruptive influences may occur during the auction. Bidders cannot raise any claims against BRK as a result of such events.
- 16.2 The buyer is always responsible for the correct payment of VAT and other costs, fees etc. in accordance with Danish and foreign regulations.
- 16.3 Unless otherwise stated in these conditions of purchase, BRK may never be held liable for bidders'/buyers' operating loss, loss of profits, other indirect losses or consequential loss.

17 PRIVACY POLICY

17.1 It is important to BRK to ensure confidentiality and security regarding the bidder's/buyer's personal information. The privacy policy can be found on bruun-rasmussen.dk.

18 COMPLAINTS, DISPUTE RESOLUTION AND APPLICABLE LAW

- 18.1 BRK can always be contacted if the bidder/buyer has a complaint.
- 18.2 If the dispute cannot be resolved, the consumer can submit a complaint to the Complaint Resolution Centre, Nævnenes Hus, Toldboden 2, 8800 Viborg, Denmark, email: naevneneshus.dk. Consumers residing in another EU country than Denmark can submit their complaint to the European Commission's Online Dispute Resolution platform via the website: http://ec.europa.eu/odr.
- 18.3 In Denmark, disputes must be brought before the City Court of Copenhagen, but see paragraphs 18.2. The mandatory rules on jurisdiction apply to consumer interests.

Bruun Rasmussen Kunstauktioner

The above is an English translation of the Danish version of the Conditions of Purchase. In case of a dispute, only the Danish version of the present Conditions of Purchase of Bruun Rasmussen is valid.
